THIS THRILL EXCEEDS SKI JUMPING

Revelstoke Ski Jumper Makes New Record on Grouse Mt. Last Week.

"All trails lead to Revelstoke this week." Duties at the Provincial Normal School, Victoria, where she is engaged, alone prevented one of its popular and well-known jumpers returning to take part in the tournament this week.

Miss Isabel Coursier, finding herself unable to come to Revelstoke for her beloved sport, arrived in Vancouver by boat Friday night, and early Saturday morning drove with a girl chum in her car, up Grouse Mountain to spend the week-end.

Parking the car, the girls put on their skis and were transferring their belongings to the ski camp when a huge black bear emerged from the forest and made a flying charge for the girls, landing on Miss Coursier with all four feet at once and bearing her to the ground, meanwhile tearing at some food supplies which she held in her arms, hunger no doubt making the creatuer desperate.

Some boys drove the animal off with ski poles and fortunately no injury was inflicted, but Miss Coursier reports she got the biggest surprise of her life and a much greater "thrill" than she ever experienced over the big jump at Revelstoke.

VANCOUVER RACER TAKES HONORS IN DISTANCE RACE

PRIZES PRESENTED AT SKI BALL WEDNESDAY

Presentation Made To Piper Inkster In Absentia by Mayor Needham on Behalf of Lieutenant-Governor Bruce.

The Masonic Hall was the scene on Wednesday night of the annual dance of the Revelstoke Ski Club. There was the usual large attendance.

President Holten opened the proceedings with an apology for the events of the afternoon, and stated that all Class A Combined and Jumping prizes were being withheld pending an adjustment of the dispute.

Mr. Laird Gordon, of Vancouver, took advantage of the occasion to congratulate "Bob" Lymburne on his splendid performance. He stated that he, with others, had arranged to make a special presentation to the local hero for his daring and sportsmanship.

Prizes were presented by Mrs. George Rennison, assisted by Mr. Gordon. A special prize of a pair of skis was made to F. Depietro, on behalf of Judge S. R. Lockeberg, by H. Fraser, of Vancouver. Mr. Lockeberg has recognized marked ability in the jumping of Depietro.

His Worship Mayor Needham read a letter of regret from His Honour Lieutenant-Governor Bruce regretting his inability to attend on account of illness. The Lieutenant-Governor, in his letter, asked Mayor Needham to present, on his behalf, to Pipe-Major Inkster, a silver medal, suitably engraved, in appreciation of the latter's services at the Armstrong Fall Fair as leader of the Revelstoke Pipe Band. Mr. Inkster was not present at the ball, and the medal will be given him at a later opportunity.

W. Lynes spoke in appreciation of Lymburne's jumping during the afternoon.

Dancing was enjoyed to music supplied by the Serenaders' Orchestra. Later a buffet supper was served in an upper hall by Mrs. Coueffin, who had charge of all catering arrangements for the Ski Club.

Lymburne To Claim Ski Title

Princeton Man Wins Class B Race—Big Attendance Featured Events of the Morning.

Revelstoke's seventeenth annual ski tournament got under way Tuesday morning, when 32 cross-country ski racers set out from the corner of Second Street and Mackenzie Avenue on the most exacting and longest cross-country ski race in the history of the sport, locally. The Class B races got away first at one minute intervals, followed by the Class A runners, who, in turn, were succeeded by the ladies, competing in the ladies' ski race.

The weather, which commenced cold turned warm with the appearance of the sun, just as the first racer came down the big incline from the water tanks.

First place honors went to A. Smedja, of Vancouver, who covered the 12 miles in the remarkably short time of 57 minutes, 25 seconds. He was followed by E. Engstad, of Burns Lake, whose time was 58:27. Jorstad, of Winnipeg, was in third place, time, 59:19, while the first of the local entries to breast the tape was E. Maki, whose time was 59:34. Others finished as follows: Kaldahl, Vancouver, 59:56; Sandnes, Prince George, 1:00:19; Nordmoe, Camrose 1:00:42; Lymburne Revelstoke, 1:01:06; Belsak, Vancouver, 1:01:24; Sneis, Vancouver, 1:02:55; Gunnarson, Revelstoke, 1:04:29; Jakobson, Princeton, 1:06:10; Lauritzen, Vancouver, 1:08:19; Stone, Vancouver, 1:15:53; Morris, Vancouver, 1:16:30.

Princeton entries figured prominently in the Class B. race. First place went to Johansen, of Princeton, time 59:58. Antzen, of the same place, the second berth within one hour, six minutes and nine seconds. Paulsen, also of Princeton, came in third, time, 1:07:11. Gunnarson, of Revelstoke, followed Paulson, time, 1:15:51. Others finished as follows: Skadja, Vancouver, 1:14:16; Davidson, Vancouver, 1:17:17; Coueffin, Revelstoke, 1:19:24; Jamieson, Revelstoke, 1:27:51.

A newcomer to the local tournament, Miss Bertha Haigh, of Vancouver, won the ladies' ski race. Mrs. Gunnarson, of Revelstoke, was in second place, followed by Miss Doris Parkes, of Vancouver, Queen of the Banff Carnival. Miss Ruth McRae and Miss A. Carlson, of this city, were also entered in this race.

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The morning events were judged by Sigurd R. Lockeberg, of Ottawa, representing the Canadian Ski Association; H. K. Grimsgaard, of the Western Branch, and W. Jamieson, captain of the Revelstoke Ski Club.
